Idea of Wikipedia


- Wiki technology allowing direct editing of web pages without additional tools.
- Wikipedia encyclopedia created using wiki
 - Created by users
 - Multi-lingual
 - Internet-based
 - Free (Creative Commons)
- Ultimate goal:

Create summary of all human knowledge in all human languages.






- 26/09/2001: Started in our Institute under my desk
- 12/01/2002: Moved and merged with global project
- 22/05/2003: 10000 articles
- 31/12/2004: 50000 articles
- 24/09/2013: 1 000 000 articles
- 14/12/2021: 1 500 000 articles
- 11th by size globally
- 15k editors, 1.5k active
- 25M unique users/month, 300M page views/month










Growth of global and English Wikipedias







How it is done.

- 13th most visited page in 2021
- Over 500 servers, multi-layered system
- Two locations (Virginia and Singapore)
- Free software
- Cheaply (USD, 2020)
 - Hosting: 2-3 mln
 - Salaries: 55 mln
 - Awards and grants: 20 mln
 - Total: 120 mln



Wikipedia, Wikimedia, Users and Editors

- Wikipedia is the encyclopedia project.
- Wikimedia is the foundation running the project.
- There is only one multi-lingual Wikipedia with language chapters.
- National Wikimedia chapters are independent (e.g. Wikimedia Polska).
- Users and editors may be registered or anonymous.
- Very minimal data is required for registration.
- Editors gain rank and privileges with number of edits.
- Administrators are community selected high-ranking Editors.
- Wikimedia Foundation has no editorial control over Wikipedia.

Five Pillars of Wikipedia

- Wikipedia is an encyclopedia
 - Wikipedia is not a soapbox, an advertising platform, vanity press, an experiment in anarchy or democracy, an indiscriminate collection of information, or a web directory. It is not a dictionary, a newspaper, or a collection of source documents, although some of its fellow Wikimedia projects are.
- Wikipedia is written from a neutral point of view

 We strive for articles in an impartial tone that document and explain major points of view, giving due weight for their prominence. We avoid advocacy, and we characterize information and issues rather than debate them. All articles must strive for verifiable accuracy, citing reliable, authoritative sources. Personal interpretations or opinions do not belong on Wikipedia.
- Wikipedia is free content that anyone can use, edit, and distribute
 Since all editors freely license their work to the public, no editor owns an article and any contributions can and may be mercilessly edited and redistributed. Respect copyright laws.
- Wikipedia's editors should treat each other with respect and civility

 Respect your fellow Wikipedians, even when you disagree. Seek consensus, avoid edit wars, and never disrupt Wikipedia to illustrate a point. Act in good faith, and assume good faith on the part of others. Be open and welcoming to newcomers.
- Wikipedia has no firm rules
 - Wikipedia has policies and guidelines, but they are not carved in stone; their content and interpretation can evolve over time. The principles and spirit matter more than literal wording, and sometimes improving Wikipedia requires making exceptions. Do not agonize over making mistakes: (almost) every past version of a page is saved, so mistakes can be easily corrected.

Impossible?

- Rules and procedures saved the project:
 - It takes 4-5 clicks to vandalise the page.
 - It takes only 1 click to fix it.
- Anonymous vandalisms are almost invisible to normal users.
- Authors of the page are alerted about changes.
- There are extensive tools for authors and editors.
- Determined attacks are still possible.
- Drift from Neutral Point of View (NPOV) is difficult to detect and prove.
- State or corporate sponsored bias in the articles probably exists.

Challenges

- Effective verification of sources.
- Biographies the most authoritative source is the least objective.
- Burn-out of editors.
- Growth of orphaned articles.
- Protection from powerful bad actors.
- Slow freeze of the project.
- Missing knowledge in narrow fields.
- 'Nonsense creep'.
- NPOV protection in difficult-to-verify fields (History, Culture, Religion etc.).

What can you do for Wikipedia?

- Scientific community operates by different rules than Wikipedia.
 - Tailored for knowledge creation.
 - Authorship-centered culture.
 - Different social structure.
 - Publish or perish. There are no points for writing Wikipedia articles.
- Wikipedia needs expert knowledge of scientists.
- Preservation of knowledge is our social function as well.
- We get no profits from doing public lectures and outreach.
- Students will use Wikipedia if we like it or not.
 Let us make sure it is an accurate source of knowledge.

Conclusions

- Wikipedia is a very valuable cultural resource.
- Collecting all human knowledge takes more than two decades.
- And more than 40 thousand people.
- It is more of the process than an achievable goal.
- The project will not survive without constant flow of new editors.
- Even small contributions substantially help:
 - Don't be anonymous if you can. Create account for your edits.
 - Start from tutorials. They are short. Don't be afraid of mistakes.
 - Find something interesting and exciting.
